Our newest oral histories will be highlighted at 7 p.m. Friday, Sept. 24, with personal stories that bring to life African American history in and beyond the District from people who experienced it.

Our narrators are:

- Dr. Wilhelmina D. Goff, a longtime educator who has also worked on the staffs of the National Council of Negro Women and Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.
- Dr. Marion E. Hines, a foreign languages educator and author of a book that details the music and ministry of an Asbury choir whose members have sung in it since the church's founding in 1836.
- Moretha Johnson, a Medstar Information Services retiree and former volunteer for local and national PTAs and a leader of the church's Crocheting for Christ ministry.
- *Rev. Irene C. Pierce, a former Asbury assistant pastor and U.S. Commerce Department retiree who served in roles related to global ministries for the United Methodist Church.*
- Dr. Joseph N. Yearwood III, a physical therapist and president of Asbury's United Methodist Men who also is active in the Kappa Alpha Psi fraternity and masonic organizations.
