The Great Thanksgiving for Advent

The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them up to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Father Almighty (almighty God), creator of heaven and earth. You formed us in your image and breathed into us the breath of life. When we turned away, and our love failed, your love remained steadfast. You delivered us from captivity, made covenant to be our sovereign God, and spoke to us through your prophets, who looked for that day when justice shall roll down like waters and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream, when nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore. And so, with your people on earth and all the company of heaven, we praise your name and join their unending hymn:

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Parking Instructions


Monday—Friday

Park on levels P2 or P3 and take the elevator to the "G" level to exit the building (to the left toward 11th Street). Drivers will scan the front of the ticket (invoice) and then scan the back (the payment). Push the call button if you have any issues and the LAZ Garage Staff will assist you.

Saturday & Sunday

Parking is available on Saturday and Sunday until 4 pm (unless otherwise noted). Park on levels P2 or P3 and take the elevator to the "G" level to exit the building (to the left toward 11th Street). The church provides parking passes (half sheet paper passes) to use as you exit the garage. You must give the parking attendant your printed ticket and the parking pass.

We meet in the Library at 9:00 am each Sunday morning.






Seasonal Mood Changes

As the weather gets cooler and the days get shorter, millions of people struggle with mood changes and other symptoms of depression. Seasonal affective disorder (SAD) is a type of depression that occurs in a seasonal pattern. Symptoms most often begin in the fall or winter when reduced exposure to daylight disrupts our internal biological clock or circadian rhythm. Seasonal changes in mood-related neurotransmitters or brain chemicals may also play a role.

What are the symptoms?

Persistent feelings of sadness
Difficulty concentrating
Lack of energy
Loss of interest in usual activities
Sleeping too much or not enough
Change in appetite (often craving more carbohydrates)



What can I do to help?

Maintain a regular sleep routine: Wake up and go to bed at the same time each day to help your internal clock adjust more easily to seasonal changes.

Get some sun: Since natural light plays a crucial role in mood regulation, spend time outside during daylight hours, even if it's just for a short walk.

Keep moving: Physical activity boosts mood and energy levels. Exercising outdoors during daylight hours will help even more.

Eat a well-balanced diet: Enjoy whole foods, lean proteins, and omega-3 fatty acids to help stabilize mood and energy. Include sources of vitamin D, the "sunlight vitamin," such as salmon, eggs, and mushrooms.

Keep in touch: Engage with friends and family rather than giving in to the urge to stay inside and hibernate. Isolation is likely to worsen mood symptoms.

Light therapy: Standard treatment includes bright-light therapy with a light box that delivers at least 10,000 lux of light. Doctors often recommend getting 30 minutes of daily exposure throughout the winter. Morning treatments are the most effective at shifting circadian rhythms and alleviating symptoms. Some start therapy in early fall to help prevent severe symptoms.

Seek professional help: Talk therapy and antidepressant medications are effective treatments for SAD.

If you find yourself struggling when the seasons change, see a doctor for a proper evaluation. Together, you can find the right tools to manage your symptoms during the winter months.


